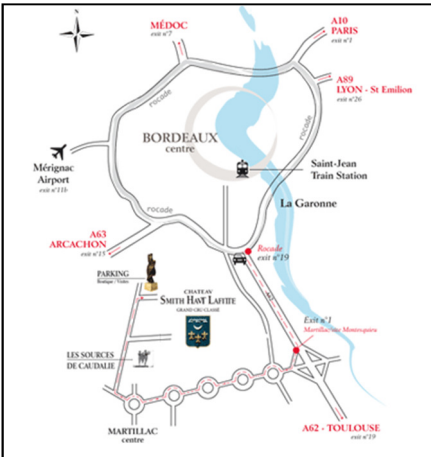


CHÂTEAU
BOUSCAUT
GRAND CRU CLASSÉ DE GRAVES



In 1962, the château was completely destroyed by a fire while the cellars remained untouched. The owner, Victor Place, oversaw its reconstruction, before selling it to a group of investors from New York in 1968. The new owners brought in the directors of Haut-Brion to manage it. Bouscaut was then acquired in 1979 by Lucien Lurton. Sophie Lurton, Lucien's daughter has been looking after Bouscaut since 1992. Laurent Cogombles, her husband, an agronomist, has also been very involved since 1997. Laurent is also the current President of the Appellation Pessac-Léognan. Throughout the years, the Lurton family has made numerous improvements to the cellars (with a circular tank room in 1990 and a concrete tank room in 2002) before complete renovation of the barrel cellars in 2010 including the building of a cellar just for the reds. This cellar's daring architecture has the particularity of being covered with barrel staves.

The Grand vin, Château Bouscaut, is annually produced in 110,000 bottles of the red wine and 20,000 bottles of the dry white.
